CHAIR FOREWORD

2021 has been another year dominated by the impact of COVID-19 on not just our sport, but our lives and our families. We should not forget those who lost loved ones over this last year and the associated grief suffered by families and clubs across Wales. In the midst of the pandemic, clubs across Wales worked hard to cope with the necessary restrictions, while some successfully innovated in order to attract and retain players. Our staff worked tirelessly to provide support, guidance, and coordination throughout the year, and I thank them for their endeavours.

The summer months did offer some respite, with outdoor bowls returning to our greens. I had the privilege of attending the international match between Wales and Ireland at Llandrindod Wells to see our bowlers in action ahead of the Commonwealth Games in 2022. I, like many of you I'm sure, am looking forward to attending the event this coming summer!

The autumn saw some light at the end of the tunnel for our indoor bowlers, with some leagues and competitions resuming although, as I write this, a surge in COVID cases now threatens to disrupt plans over the coming months.

From a very personal perspective, it's now almost a year since I took on the role of Chair from Ken Burton. Ken stepped down from his role on the Board in January 2021 and we thank him for his commitment to the sport over many years. COVID aside, it's been an eventful and exciting year! A highlight for me were the Stroke Survivor sessions held in association with the Stroke Association – a great example of how bowls can truly be a sport for all.

Our performance and development groups have continued to work hard to help develop the sport from grass roots to elite performance levels. As a 'techie' I'm really interested on their work on the use of technology to support player development. We are also investigating the use of video streaming technology to further promote the sport on social media channels – where we've seen an increased engagement over the last year.

Our work with our NGB partners continues to go from strength to strength and I thank them for their engagement, their enthusiasm and their commitment to changing our sport for the better. Significantly, we recently issued a tender for an independent review of the sport of bowls in Wales. The review will look at all aspects of the sport and will provide the opportunity for all interested parties to share their views.

In closing, can I thank my fellow Board members for their continuing hard work. They, like many others across Wales, give their time, knowledge and energy freely in support of the game in Wales and we must recognise the value gained from their work. Can I also thank colleagues from Sport Wales for their continued support for Bowls, their input and encouragement to our Board and their personal support to me in my new role.

My hope, when restrictions next allow, is that I'll meet many of you in person over the coming months. However, for now, can I take this opportunity to wish you all well for 2022-23, in the hope that we return to some sort of normal in the not too distant future.

Bowls Awareness Campaign was open to clubs from all codes of the game, Lawn, Crown Green, Indoor and Short Mat.

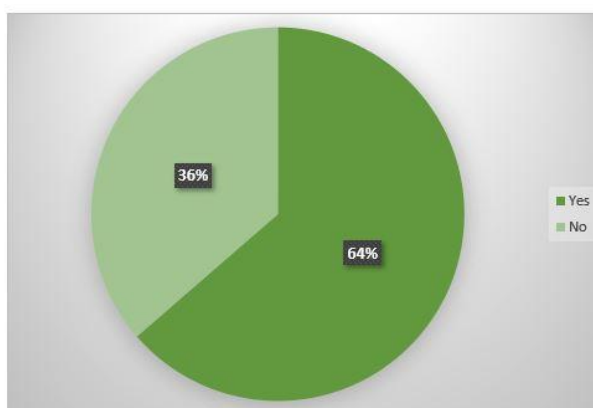
Campaign Objectives

STROKE ASSOCIATION

The partnership with the Stroke Association started back in 2019, where we started a session at Cynon Valley bowls club. The project was supported by Rhondda Cynon Taf council's Sport Development team; SportRCT, and as a result grew to include GP Referrals. The impact the sessions had upon the participants was significant and was a pleasure to hear about and witness.

So, we were disappointed when sessions had to stop in February 2020 due to the pandemic. However, we took this opportunity to create something new and with the support of the National Governing Bodies, Dai Prosser and the Stroke Association we created a Virtual Bowls programme. The aim of the project was to provide some help and guidance for people affected by a stroke and get them learning, interacting and enjoying bowls at home. We hoped following the project members may even have the confidence to join a club. I am pleased to say that some members have continued to play bowls and join local bowls clubs. The virtual bowls project was a great success and allowed us to continue delivering bowls and witness the 'power of bowls'.

Continuing our partnership with the Stroke Association and the support of the Welsh Short Mat Bowling Association, we have recently started a new project based in Milford Haven for Stroke Survivors. The face-to-face sessions have had a fantastic turnout and continue to gain new members on a weekly basis. The project was originally for 8 weeks but due to the success and popularity we have extended the funding for another 8 weeks, after this we believe the Stroke Survivor session will become self-sufficient and continue to run.

BOWLSWALES- INNOVATION FUND.

In recognition of the effect that COVID-19 had brought on the sport and leisure sector, the Welsh Government provided additional funding to support the sector in its greatest need. The fund was intended to provide essential support to sports clubs and organisations, independent providers and sporting events who have all faced significant challenges during the crisis and continued to be severely impacted.

The way BowlsWales chose to use this investment and, subsequent progress towards identified priorities, continues to be monitored through quarterly accountability discussions between Sport Wales and BowlsWales as its National Partner.

In order to provide the widest possible opportunity to maximise the benefits from this additional funding, BowlsWales decided to allocate the fund to create a specific initiative and developed The Bowls Innovation Fund.

The Bowls Innovation Fund received a high number of applications were received with the total funds requested reaching £96,437.37. BowlsWales funded 7 clubs and 1 NGB with a total of £31,316.67 invested into innovative ideas to support bowls.

SPORT WALES- BE ACTIVE FUND

The **Be Active Wales Fund** aims to **protect** and **progress** clubs and organisations through the Covid-19 pandemic and into the future. The fund has already helped many clubs and organisations across Wales face the challenges caused by the pandemic. BowlsWales is delighted that 25 Bowls clubs have benefitted from the funding and have received a total of £62,498.00 this financially year (April 2021 to present date).

This grant remains open and in association with the National Governing bodies we continue to sport clubs through the grant application process.

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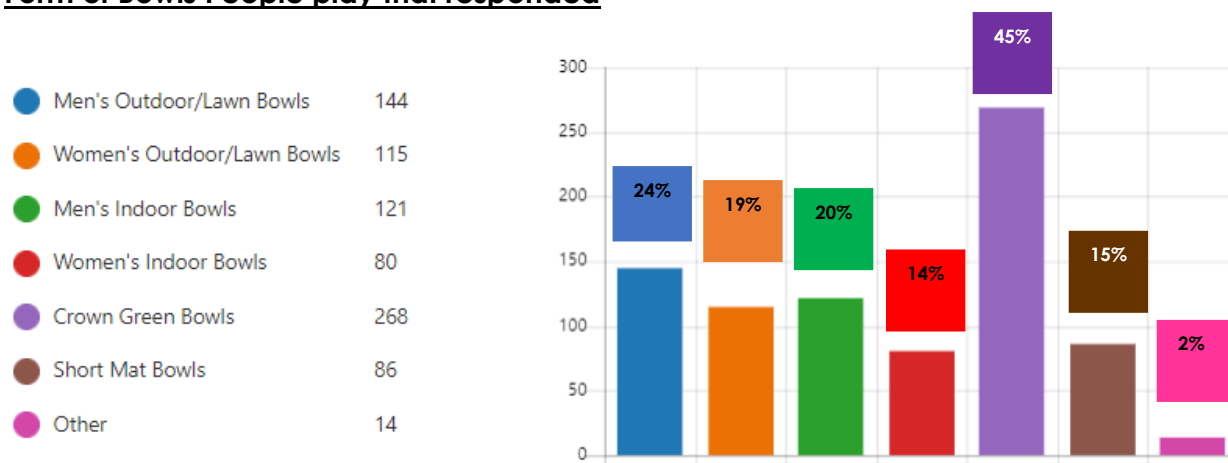
Equality Monitoring Survey

BowlsWales in partnership with the National Governing Bodies (WBA, WWBA, WIBA, WLBA, WSMBA, WCGBA, WBUA) developed an Equality Monitoring Survey.

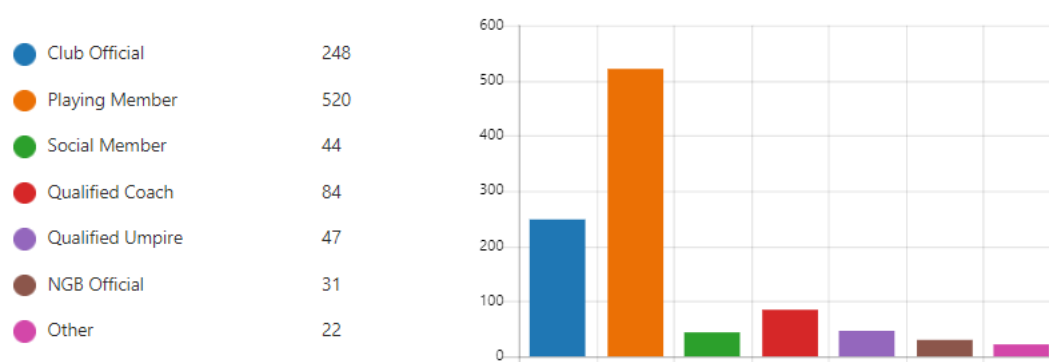
As a sport, bowls has the potential to be one of the most inclusive sports, allowing people of ages and abilities to engage with bowls. At present, there is a limited amount of data that exists in order to evidence the current makeup of the Welsh bowling community. BowlsWales and the National Governing Bodies are committed to making bowls accessible to all. To help with this data gap, we wanted to ask the bowling community questions to have a better understand of the current representation of those involved in the game at all levels.

The survey was conducted online using Microsoft forms and was for anyone in the bowling community over 18 years old across all codes of the game. There was a total of 608 responses, 17 of which from U18's. Below are snippets of the survey responses. Further detailed analysis will be completed and shared wider to inform an equality and inclusion action plan.

PERFORMANCE GROUP UPDATE



The 2020 season saw performance bowls being paused due to the pandemic; however, the waiting was over which saw performance bowls return across the code of the game in 2021.

The Performance Group have been meeting monthly across the year, working on exciting new projects to support performance bowls. These projects include a performance analysis for each code of the game, supporting the data collection of trials, team selection and video analysis across competitions and events. The group is excited for the chosen performance analysis software to be trialled by the Indoor National Governing Bodies in 2022.

The performance Group have also been working on a project to establish a Junior Bowls Academy which encompasses both outdoor and indoor. The group have set up a subcommittee to develop these ideas and bring a project proposal detailing, required roles, resources, support and structure of the academy.

Finally, with ongoing conversations with the group and the BowlsWales Board, it was agreed to carry out work to document how performance improvement funding is allocated. The BowlsWales Board were keen to support activities designed to develop and improve our athletes across all forms of Bowls in Wales. BowlsWales recognised the important contribution that competitive play makes to the pursuit of excellence at the elite level within our sport, and how they need to ensure such activity is appropriately funded.

The document set out how the Board believes the funding can make the most effective use of what was available and provided clarity for the National Governing Bodies of the various codes as they develop their funding applications each year. BowlsWales are pleased to say they have funded the NGB's for 2021 season.

NATIONAL GOVERNING BODIES

WELSH INDOOR BOWLING ASSOCIATION

2021 proved a very challenging year for indoor bowls in Wales. The Pandemic closed all our indoor stadiums from January to September leading to the postponement or cancellation of all events at national and international level.

Off the green things faired a lot better, work on Unification moved forward with both the Welsh Indoor Bowls Association and Welsh Ladies Indoor Bowls Association agreeing a new constitution and mechanism for appointing officer for the new Welsh Indoor Bowls organisation.

A new Director of Bowls Steve Jackson from Cardiff Indoor Bowls Club was appointed, by the time you read this report Steve will have selected three international squads, made some new friends, and lost a few, that is the nature of team selection.

Allyson Lawrence became our first female Junior Co-ordinator and immediately set about contacting clubs to identify new young talent, her hard work has paid off.

Allyson has also linked up with Steve Jackson and Nigel Williams to arrange development days and tournaments.

September saw the return of competitive indoor bowls with the completion of the 2019 season tournaments and the resumption of our championship matches.

Numbers returning to the sport are down, but stadiums are working hard to build up confidence and get people back playing our wonderful sport.

Officers of the Welsh Indoor Bowls Association have held regular meetings with the Directors and Staff of Bowls Wales and progress has been made on a range of subjects from communications, safeguarding, performance and funding our working relationship with Bowls Wales is on an upward curve and we look forward to 2022 with optimism

We are custodians of a great sport that is accessible to everyone we are all duty bound to do everything we can to promote bowls as a sport for all.

WELSH WOMEN'S BOWLING ASSOCIATION

Another challenging year, but one where some of us returned to the bowling greens which was really positive news, despite having to put in risk assessments and restrictions to protect against COVID. Undoubtedly our sport like many others is taking time to recover, but I want to assure you that the WWBA will be doing everything it can to support our members and our clubs through this difficult time and help us all to adjust to the “new normal”. Despite this negativity, I am delighted to report some really positive stories from the year and hopefully we can build on these and making more going forward.

Logo - We have introduced a new Logo in 2021 and thanks goes to BowlsWales for helping with the design and the funding – it now says who we are and not just WWBA for those who do not know what this stands for.

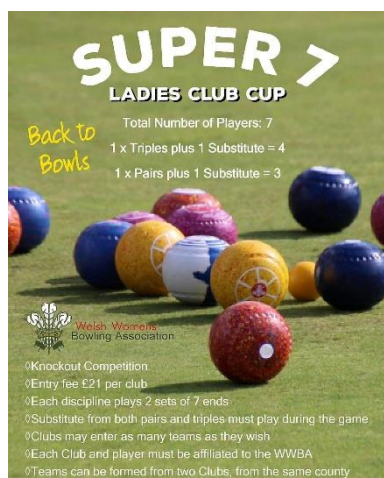
Coffee Mornings – we continued to hold our virtual coffee mornings especially during the Winter/lock down period and it has been lovely to catch up and share stories



Covid Competitions – It was decided not to run Welsh Competitions during 2021 as we did not want to put pressure on members to return to bowls and travel. Also, as the British Isles Championships were cancelled, we still wanted to give our 2019 winners a chance to compete when these competitions finally return.

However, for those that wanted to return to competitive bowling, we decided to run some “Welsh Covid Competitions”. We took opportunity to introduce some different formats and also enabled players to play with different players from other clubs and counties. It was great to see new bowlers taking part and I must stress at this point – Welsh competitions are for all female bowlers– anyone can enter them.

We introduced a new Super 7 Welsh Club Cup, – this was run in zones to save travel and as there were limited numbers to a team made it more accessible as not all bowlers had returned to play due to Covid.



These competitions were run at Llandrindod Wells because of green space, and we knew that all Covid risk assessments were in place. Thank you to Llandrindod Wells Club and especially Sam Roff for all their help and support.

The competitions were a great success and despite some negativity, there was a lot of positive comments, and I would like to thank all those who took part. There was much interest especially in the Aussie Pairs from both men and women and some were taking back to their clubs to give it a go. It was great to see everyone having fun at the Aussie Style BPL, with music, live streaming and some great bowling – thanks to Sarah Nicholls for the WWBA selfie board

Bowls Awareness Campaign - It was really positive to see so many getting involved with the Bowls Awareness Campaign and seeing attendance at the virtual online workshops put on by BowlsWales. The published case studies were a real inspiration in attracting members – thanks to clubs such as Machen, Lampeter, New Quay, Pentyrch and Berriew for sharing these stories.

It has been really beneficial, via BowlsWales, to link in with Local Authorities, who are really supportive of bowls and want to push the sport forward. We had a number of opportunities in various areas to take part in promotional events, but unfortunately response from counties to take part has been limited.

It was also encouraging to see during the year more ladies' sections being introduced and more mixed competitions appearing as well as successful men's and ladies' competitions. Good to hear of the success stories of clubs such as Ynysyawl, Rhayader, Pentyrch, Pantgeg Park and The Bryn.

Bowls Europe - European Bowls has now become a limited company "Bowls Europe". The European Championships has changed format and will now consist of 5 women and 5 men. The event will be held in July 2022 and will be followed by a two day European Open.

Commonwealth Games – These will be held in July/August 2022 in Birmingham. Congratulations to Anwen Butten, Laura Daniels, Melanie Thomas, Ysie White, Sara Nicholls and Caroline Taylor who have been nominated for selection to Team Wales following trials and three test matches held in 2021. As continued preparation, we hope to play more test matches prior to the Games.

Anwen Batten continues as a Team Wales ambassador and is involved in meetings relating to the Games from a player perspective.

Hazel Wilson has also attended Welsh Sport Meetings every few weeks with Commonwealth Games and Welsh Government representatives to discuss the Covid impact on sport in Wales.

WELSH CROWN GREEN BOWLING ASSOCIATION

Whilst the lessening of the restrictions resulting from the Coronavirus pandemic during the summer of 2021 meant that more Bowls was played in 2021 than in 2020, given that the restrictions remained in place throughout the Spring, league bowling was slow to commence which meant that most leagues operated with a restricted fixture list and a number of Bowling Clubs did not take part at all. It is hoped that a fuller season will be possible in 2022.

It is pleasing that the vast majority of Clubs appear to be weathering the 'pandemic storm' and a hardship fund set up with the assistance of Bowls Wales did not need to be utilised.

Nationally, all our Welsh Teams, apart from the Juniors where the competition was not held, entered the UK wide competitions and whilst no significant successes were recorded it was good to be back. With financial support from Bowls Wales the Welsh Juniors were entered into a competition set up in place of the usual UK wide matches and this proved successful particularly in terms of development.

Our traditional merit competitions were held in 2021 having been cancelled in 2020 but in view of the constraints on entry as a result of the virus they were held on a 'one off' informal basis for Seniors, Ladies, Juniors and Veterans together with the Mixed Pairs. National competitions were still held, and the Wales qualifiers attended in the usual way. It was pleasing that Kian Thomas of Esclusham BC who was runner up in the Welsh Junior Merit went on to reach the final of the BCGBA Junior Merit but was runner-up. A great achievement for a young Welsh bowler.

Off the Green, the WCGBA website was updated, and a new Coaching scheme was introduced. We are grateful for Bowls Wales support in both these ventures.

Overall, whilst the pandemic has clearly had a detrimental effect, we remain optimistic for the future and hope for a return to something close to normality in 2022.

WELSH LADIES INDOOR BOWLING ASSOCIATION

The WLIBA have very little to report as the calendar of events for the rest of the year has been cancelled. There is an exemption for the National semi-finals on Saturday 15th January and hopefully the National Finals Day to be held on Sunday 16th January.

WELSH BOWLS UMPIRES ASSOCIATION

Like all other sports bowls has been hit hard by Covid 19 and last year's matches were more or less cancelled. It was good that, for the men anyway, the Carruthers Shield and league fixtures got under way in April of this year and umpires were once again called into action. Some umpires were understandably reluctant to officiate which gave more opportunities for others to do the bulk of the work. With the Commonwealth Games being held in Birmingham in July & August 2022 the cream of Welsh bowlers were on display during the trials at Llandrindod Wells. Competition was fierce and this resulted in some fantastic bowling which, if repeated, at the games bodes well for some medals for the Welsh team. Congratulations to those nominated for selection for Team Wales and we wish them well and make us proud of them.

The majority of the County Championship & Senior Championship teams played their matches with umpires on duty once again. The main opportunity for umpires came during two weeks in September, again at Llandrindod Wells, when the National Championships took place. The markers and umpires were kept very busy, and the spectators witnessed some fantastic bowling and great sportsmanship.

During 2020 the WBUA had not been able to hold any seminars or practical's, so it was with some relief that these finally went ahead towards the end of 2021. The seminars were well attended, and many were glad to get the chance to practice measuring and judging distances again. We had hoped to have more than half a dozen candidates for the Level 1 umpires' practical being staged at Merthyr Tydfil Indoor Bowling Club, but for various reasons only three could make it. However, all three candidates were successful and are now using this qualification and about to or have umpired their first matches. It is always good to get some new umpires on the circuit as this eases the load on those who can generally be relied on to officiate. Two umpires who qualified in 2017 were put through their paces during the Level 2 practical, and both were successful. Hopefully they may go on to become International Technical Officials (ITO's) and be called into action at major bowls tournaments in the future. Hopefully some of our current ITO's will be selected to officiate at the Commonwealth Games next summer which would be a real honour and reward for their services over the years.

Since the practical's more candidates have come forward wishing to become an umpire and the WBUA will be running a recruitment campaign to try and attract even more interest. Please look out for the posters which will be appearing on all of the bowling clubs' noticeboards shortly. If anyone fancies having a go then please get in touch. You have to do the work, but once

qualified you will find it a rewarding experience and you get to watch some great bowlers in action at close hand.

WELSH SHORT MAT BOWLS ASSOCIATION

Due to the pandemic most of our clubs are in small venues and unable to keep to the distancing rules and have not started up. Leagues are being played in a few counties. Hopefully later in the year we will be able to organize our League Championships Competition.

Just before lockdown we managed to complete our national finals in Singles, Pairs, Triples and Fours, this in turn allowed us to formulate a National Squad.

Our plan to provide taster sessions in various communities is on hold as these were to target secondary schools and Leisure Centres. Although some clubs have registered some new members.

The British Isles Short Mat Championships in Scarborough at the end of January 21 may need to be put forward and World Bowls in Belgium in March is ongoing.

Thanks to Bowls Wales for the support and funding we received in these difficult times.

WELSH BOWLS ASSOCIATION

Thanks to all the officers and bowlers who looked after this game of ours due to the restrictions imposed on Wales as a whole regarding the COVID crisis which we experienced through 2020 and 2021. They did a tremendous job policing it and on behalf of myself and the officers thank you for your time and effort that you all put into it to enable the bowling season to take place.

Thank you to the staff at BowlsWales for their help in putting together, the legislation that was required to enable outdoor bowls to take place during 2021, this took many hours of work to generate and put on the respective web sites and I am grateful for their assistance in this matter.

The National Finals were held slightly later this year due restrictions. The feedback was they were well organised and run and a congratulations go to John Manfield and John Phillips for a job well done.

These were organised by both Team Managers Robert Weale and Hazel Wilson who organised the events to a high standard and were very pleased the way that they all turned out and the standard of bowls produced.
